For those of us associated with Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative, we lost a friend and former employee in October who held a special place in our heart. We called him “Cubby.” Many of you have seen Darrel Cubbison running our annual meetings for years or saw him putting on microwave demonstrations back in the day, or maybe announcing the opening of

the Muskingum County Blue Ribbon Fair. He had been known to fill in for Mr. Claus at times as well, so it seems fitting to share a few thoughts today about Cubby.

Cubby was our member services manager here at GMEC for many years, retiring in January of 2008. For most who got to know him, he was Guernsey-Muskingum Electric — the guy who ran the company. Truth be told, Darrel never was the CEO/manager, but he was the face of the cooperative at every annual meeting or community event that GMEC had any part in. All our employees have and continue to be an asset to you, the member, and I am proud of each one. But Cubby was one of a kind. I thought this would be a good time to celebrate the life of Darrel Cubbison, prior to Christmas and after the county fair season.

I attended the funeral service and thought the message was right on target for memorializing Cubby’s life at Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative over the many years. The minister, Keith Taylor, gave me permission to use a part of his message in this article today. It goes like this:

“I read of a man who stood to speak at the funeral of a friend.

He referred to the dates on the tombstone from the beginning to the end.

He noted that first came the date of birth and spoke the following date with tears, but he said what mattered most of all was the dash between those years.

For that dash represents all the time that they spent alive on earth.”

So how did Darrel spend those years? For all of us who knew Cubby, we remember things during that dash. It might be putting in electric water heaters or emceeding the annual meeting or maybe a “welcome to the Muskingum

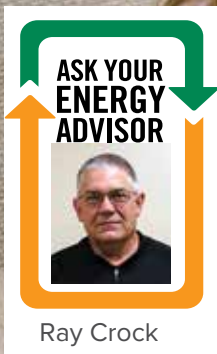


Welcome Staci Burke

Powerful fun



Five cool ways to power your yuletide

Electricity offers one way to brighten gift choices as innovators keep coming up with new gadgets and gizmos to power our lives with efficiency and fun. Here are five electric ideas to add pizzazz to your holiday shopping list.

1. Healthy French fries? Electric air fryers have been around since 2010, but their popularity started taking off about five years ago. As health-consciousness increased, people liked the idea of these cookers that could prepare traditional fried favorites with much less oil. Sales bumped up even more as the pandemic kept people at home and paying more attention to their cooking. Air fryers aren't really fryers, but rather, high-heat convection devices that simulate traditional recipes like chicken tenders, egg rolls, potato chips, fried vegetables, and apple fritters.

2. Hit the road "Electric vehicles" doesn't mean just cars and trucks anymore. The sidewalks of college campuses and downtowns are now shared with electric scooters. If you're having trouble keeping up with a bicycle-fanatic, an electric bike might help you scale those steep hills. You can go off-road with an electric all-terrain vehicle. And if you were born to be wild, you can head out on the highway on a battery-powered motorcycle — an electric Harley boasts instant 100% torque, electronic safety features, and the ability to use your smartphone for checking battery status and stolen-vehicle tracking.

3. Walk the talk Walkie-talkies are one of those old technologies for staying in touch that still work great for businesses, conference coordination, or hiking and camping. They can help keep a caravan of cars and trailers together. Shop carefully and know what you'll use them for — the range can vary from a half-mile to 20 miles, depending on the type of model and whether they'll be used indoors or outdoors.

4. Easy reader If you're tired of squinting at the little screen on your phone, take a look at tablets. They come in a variety of screen sizes that make it easier to enjoy that magazine, detective novel, streaming movie, or TV show. Most models come with the ability for you to write or draw on them.

5. Packing power A portable charger may be one of the least-exciting gifts you can give or get, but you'll change that thinking when your phone's about to die as you hike over a hill and see a sunset vista to photograph. A word of advice — charge it up the day before; the smallest ones for your purse or pocket tend not to hold a charge for the several weeks they sit in a drawer waiting for the next event.

Shop carefully and know how you want to use the device — they all come with a variety of features and prices. And be cyber safe: Anything connected to the internet can be hacked, so set a strong password. Then focus on having a blast.



The Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative Scholarship in honor of Jerry Kackley



In 1980, Jerry Kackley, a high school senior at Meadowbrook High School, won the Guernsey-Muskingum Scholarship. At the time, each high school in the GMEC territory could nominate one boy and one girl to compete for the scholarship. Who knew that 12 years later, Jerry would become employed by GMEC and would eventually become general manager/CEO? In 2018, Jerry was diagnosed with cancer and in early 2019, made the decision to retire to spend time with his family.

Shortly before Jerry passed away, he and his wife, Debbie, decided that they needed to give back to the GMEC members who supported him and his family through

the years. This led to the creation of the Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative Scholarship in Honor of Jerry Kackley. Jerry's family, with the help of the Muskingum County Community Foundation, has created a \$750 scholarship to honor Jerry.

To be eligible for the GMEC Scholarship in Honor of Jerry Kackley, you must be a senior with a 3.0 GPA or higher whose parents/guardians are members of Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative. 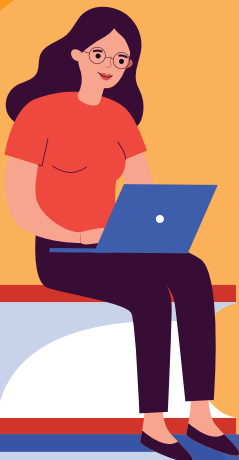

CO-OP NEWS

Geothermal

We have a \$300 energy credit to help pay for the most efficient underground heating, cooling, and hot water system available today. To be eligible, the geothermal unit must be ENERGY STAR-rated and have a radio-controlled switch installed on the unit and on the electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity. Over 280 of our members are using geothermal.

Dual Fuel

If you install a new add-on electric heat pump with a fossil-fuel backup and have an electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity, you are eligible for a \$300 energy credit. Radio-controlled switches must be installed on both the heat pump and water heater. Please call your cooperative for details. Over 890 members are using Dual Fuel.



Cool Returns

Are you having a new electric heat pump with electric resistant heat backup installed? Allow your cooperative to install a radio-controlled switch and receive a \$100 energy credit. Over 170 members are using Cool Returns.

ENERGY STAR

Did you buy a new ENERGY STAR refrigerator, freezer, or central air conditioner? We may have a \$100 energy credit for you. Call member services for details.

Electric vehicle chargers

Level 2 electric vehicle charges may be eligible to receive a \$250 energy credit. Call us for more information.

Water heaters

Need a new water heater? We offer a 50-gallon Vaughn tank or an 85-gallon Marathon tank at rebated prices with free delivery. We also have \$75 or \$125 energy credits for you if you purchase a tank somewhere else. Give us a call for details.

Radio-controlled switch

What a deal! If you don't already have a radio-controlled switch (RCS) for your electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity, please call, and we will install one at no charge. Over 5,600 GMEC

members have an RCS on their water heaters. The switch entitles you to a discount and free maintenance (except cleaning), including parts and labor, on your electric water heater. Some exclusions apply; call us for details.

GenerLink

We want you to use your portable generator safely. Call the member services department at GMEC and ask about GenerLink. GenerLink eliminates the use of extension cords and other connections that can be dangerous to members and linemen. Over 200 members currently have a GenerLink installed at their homes.

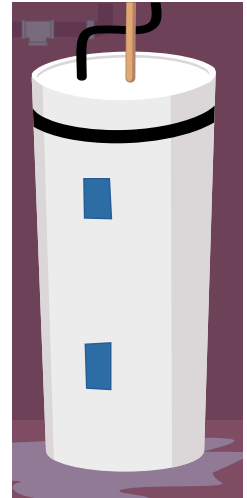
Meter reading
